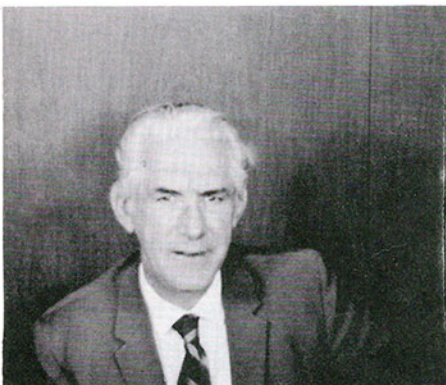

YOUR PROFIT-SHARING PLAN TO RECEIVE SIXTH COMPANY CONTRIBUTION

December 5, 1970

A. R. Wilfley & Sons will contribute \$70,000.00 to your profit-sharing plan for this calendar year. The money will be paid over in early 1971. That's just over 7½% of the total payroll covered and brings to \$402,000 the total contributed by the company. After payments to employees during 1970, and including the forthcoming company contribution, here's how the profit-sharing plan is putting its money to work today:

Note: Since the investment funds themselves have modest cash positions, the total money in your profit-sharing plan is a little less than half in reserves, a little more than half in the market.

Investment work for the first eleven months of 1970 resulted in a loss in value of approximately 6%. This compares favorably to a loss of 18% for the averaged results of 505 mutual funds and a loss of 10% for the Standard & Poor's 500 stock average.

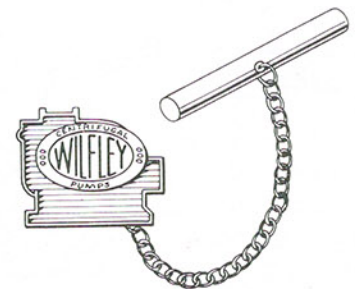

Anyone desiring additional education which would be beneficial in their work should solicit approval from management. 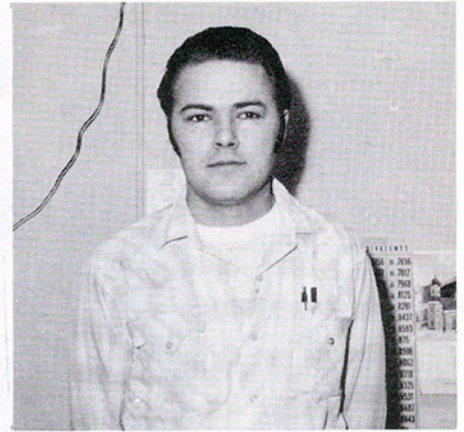

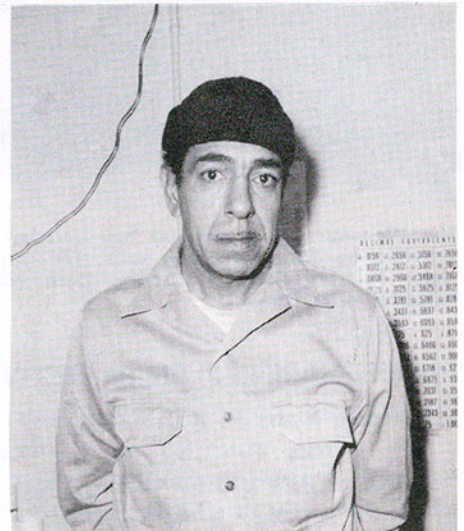

through a two-year period during which the prices of all kinds of stocks have dropped way down. Those of you with payroll deduction plans have been able to buy stocks at prices not seen for many years. Don't get discouraged. The profit-sharing plan has come through these trying times in better shape than many investors.

The economic and business outlook is improving, very slowly it's true, but nevertheless improving. This is a time to be getting more enthusiastic about the prospects for stock prices, but not a time to be carried away by that en-

thusiasm. So, very gradually, the money in reserve is being decreased, and the money invested in the stock market is being increased.

There are 88 of you covered by the plan now. Sometime during 1971, your combined shares in the plan may well cross the half million dollar mark. That's important to you. Already, substantial amounts are being distributed. During 1970, Charles Heffner, Alexander Schaefer, John Baker, Arthur McAndrew, Wilhelm Jensen, Helen McSpadden, George Zellers, James Lenard and Nancy Deem shared \$29,521 in retirement benefits.

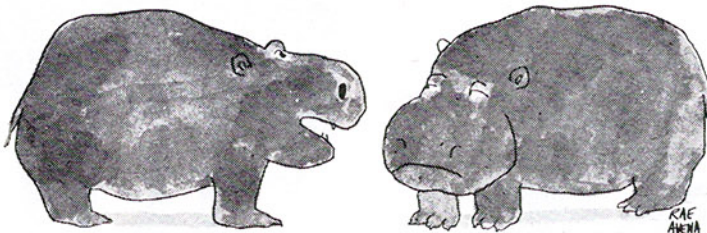
